



"Where is Jefferson" won a silver in open historical category at the Chicago Show.

Heads and hands are Hornet, pistol was given to me by Don Johnson, sword and pitch fork are historex. Figures are scratch built.

Based on true story. June 1781. Col. Tarleton with some Dragoons came into Charlottesville looking for Jefferson and the General Assembly that were convening in Charlottesville since the British occupied Richmond; however, Jefferson and the general assembly were warned of the approaching Dragoons by the efforts of Jack Joulet, a local citizen. The Dragoons, without Tarleton, then went up to Monticello and guestioned the enslaved population, perhaps at gunpoint, on Jefferson's whereabouts. The enslaved did not divulge any info. Tarleton and the Dragoons then left the area since Lafayette and his light infantry were approaching. Both armies would meet several months later at Yorktown.





